Cocotte often sang with her sisters:


"Hens are smart,

without space to spread their wings!"





Cocotte shivered: "That's no life! Hens need freedom, grass, and light."


> "Hens are smart, hens are kind, hens keep friends in heart and mind!"

She fluffed her feathers and said: "I must show the **King** the truth!"












To test Cocotte, the King showed her pictures of two hens: One who she locked eyes with while entering the barn, One of another hen who she had never seen before.









Cocotte scratched at the leaf with five grains.

King Delhaize gasped.


Cocotte had chosen correctly.
