

The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Westside Coalition was founded in 1986, as a community partnership with the City of Santa Monica, Santa Monica College, Westside Interfaith Council, NAACP Santa Monica Venice Branch, Neighborhood Resource Development Corporation, Temple Beth Shir Shalom, NCCJ (which became the Human Relations Council of Santa Monica Bay Area) and others.

Today the coalition is a nonprofit organization comprised of a diverse group of volunteers including individual community members, churches, institutions, community organizations, and businesses.



Linda Alvarez (singer) is a talented gospel singer known throughout Southern California for her powerful voice and dynamic performance style. Many audiences have enjoyed her remarkable one-woman show, "The Veil of Mahalia," featuring the life of Mahalia Jackson in song. Severin Behnen (piano) is a versatile musician who plays a wide variety of musical styles including classical, bluegrass, jazz, avant-garde, and opera. A talented composer, his works have been performed in a variety of venues, including Disney Hall. He has toured and performed throughout the US and Asia. In 2011, he was named journalist of the Year by the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Assn and his columns have been recognized by the National Assn of Black Journalists as well as the Online News Assn. His TED Talk on LGBTQ equality has more than 1.6 million views.




EDUCATION AWARD WINNERS




SUE SCHUERMAN & SALLY MENDELSOHN AWARD

LAVERNE ROSS

FOR PRESERVING THE LEGACY OF DR. KING BY BRINGING THE
JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION OF FREEDOM TO SANTA MONICA AND
LEADING THE COALITION'S EFFORTS TO RECOGNIZE
STUDENT EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT

Santa Monica's Ms. Juneteenth: LaVerne Ross

Ms. LaVerne Ross is a community treasure as well as a lifetime achiever. Her talents run from theater arts to cosmetology. But we recognize her today for her decades of community leadership as a longtime supporter of education and producer of the cultural event we know as "Juneteenth."

Arriving in Santa Monica in 1957 from Lubbock, Texas, Ms. Ross was welcomed by relatives who had recently been displaced from the Belmar Triangle. A decade later they were displaced by the Santa Monica Freeway. But she and her family endured.

While attending Santa Monica High School, Ms. Ross took an elective course in Theater and was cast in the senior play. Aspiring to be an actress, she enrolled in Theater Arts classes at Santa Monica College.

Then, she met and married Mr. Raven Ross and together they raised two children. Later, she enrolled at California State University, Northridge, took UCLA Extension classes and earned a master certificate in cosmetology. For decades she ran her own beauty salon next to a Black-owned barbershop in the 1800 block of Broadway.

In 1991, Ms. Ross thought back to the celebrations she knew as a child in Texas. For over a hundred years, Black Texans had gathered the week of the 19th of June at a place called Comanche Creek. Each year, they read the Emancipation Proclamation aloud, picnicked under the oak trees, danced and sang in celebration of the 19th of June, 1865 when news arrived in Texas of the end of slavery.

She asked "Why not bring this event to Santa Monica?" It was time. And there was money! Santa Monica's Assistant City Manager Susan McCarthy had just learned of an opportunity to receive state funding if it were to be used on a cultural event. Ms. Ross convinced her that a Juneteenth Celebration was exactly the cultural event the City should sponsor. As she tells it, "the rest is history."

The first Santa Monica Juneteenth Festival was held outdoors, just like in Texas. Children's voices lent a festive air to the scene in Virginia Ave Park. NAACP President Norm Curry ran the barbecue. There was homemade peach cobbler for dessert.

Over the years, Ms. Ross produced ever more elaborate and celebratory Juneteenth events. The 20th anniversary of the event, in 2011, was a fundraiser that included a Founders' Day supper in the SGI community room, honoring Former Mayor Nat Trives as well as the Mayor at that time, Richard Bloom.

Ms. Ross donated her time to many other causes as well. Her events brought attention to serious health concerns that affect the Black community. For years, she served on the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr Westside Coalition Reception and Education Awards Committee. She was given the Humanitarian Award by the California State Chapter of the Eastern Star.

Last year's local Juneteenth community celebration, produced by Rev. Lemuel "Mack" Mossett's congregation and held outdoors on the Calvary Baptist Church campus, was especially sweet because it marked the first time that the entire country celebrated Juneteenth—as a NATIONAL holiday. On June 19, 2021 Ms. Ross received well-deserved recognition from the City for bringing Juneteenth to Santa Monica three decades earlier.

Ms. Ross may have had to give up her dream of becoming an actress but she has been Santa Monica's Leading Lady of Community Service. She has led with impeccable style, grace and just the right blend of celebration and seriousness. Thank you, Ms. Juneteenth, and God Bless You, from a grateful Santa Monica.


